
## 5 PATTERNS FOR MINOR THE PENTATONIC SCALE

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Note: pattern 1 starts on the first fret (F note) in this example. That makes this example "F Minor Pentatonic." Think of these 5 patterns as "one big interlocking pattern" with the white Dot from pattern 1 being the starting, root note.

IF WE MOVE THE PATTERN 1 WHITE DOT TO START ON THE 5TH FRET OF THE 6TH STRING (A NOTE) WE NOW HAVE AN "A MINOR PENTATONIC." All other patterns would then be based off pattern 1 (from A note fret 5) making all patterns "A Minor Pentatonic." IF WE MOVE IT TO THE (G NOTE 3RD FRET) ALL PATTERNS WOULD BE "G MINOR PENTATONIC." GET IT?

Rule: If a pattern should start on the 12th fret you may also use it on the zero fret. They are the same/octaves notes. same applies for patterns 13th fret=1st fret, 14th fret=2nd fret, 15th fret=3rd, etc. Don't worry, You'll get it!
